## LEAF COLLECTION

With such a warm Fall, our leaves have been coming down forever. The Maples were about three weeks late this year in dropping so I guess we'll be raking until Christmas.

The City Street Department began curbside pick earlier this month and will continue through December. But if you're concerned about curb damage, The Department of Public Works suggests bagging them.

If you bag your leaves - the City Sanitation Department also began routinely picking up bags November and will continue through the end of December, after that date they have to be called (just like other bulky items) at 989-3175.

#### GARBAGE COLLECTION

Monday and Thursday of each week.

NO recyclables!! NO cardboard!!

It is the HOMEOWNER's responsibility to contact the Sanitation Department for large bulky items, metal, leaves, yard debris, clean wood, etc. Anything that seems out of the ordinary for regular trash disposal.

Remember branches or any large pieces of wood can be no longer than 4 ft and should be bundled.

#### **COUNTY RECYCLE**

# **Every other Thursday**

December 10 24 January 7 21 February 4 18

The following guidelines are a REQUIREMENT for recycling in Mercer County.

#### **GREEN BUCKET**

Newspaper and inserts, magazines and catalogs, stationery and mail, school paper, copier and computer paper, index cards and file folders, dry food and detergent boxes, shoe and gift boxes, paper bags and telephone books. KEEP CLEAN AND DRY

**Do Not Include:** paper towels, tissues, tissue paper, waxed papers, books, carbon papers, padding materials & padded envelopes, plastic window envelopes, food stained boxes such as pizza or frozen food.

#### YELLOW BUCKET

Glass (clear, green & brown), food & beverage containers : RINSE, REMOVE LIDS & RINGS, DO NOT BREAK

Cans - Aluminum, tin & bi-metal cans : EMPTY & CLEAN

Plastic Bottles — only #1 or #2 (stamped on bottom) : EMPTY & RINSE, REMOVE LIDS & RINGS, FLATTEN

Aseptic Boxes & Polycoated Beverage Cartons : EMPTY & RINSE, FLATTEN

**Do Not Include:** ceramics, mirrors, crystal, drinking glasses, dishes, light bulbs, TV tubes, window and auto glass, Pyrex, medicine bottles, foil, baking or roasting pans, scrap metal or paint cans, Styrofoam, motor oil or antifreeze containers, plastic tubs, plastic dishes, any plastic bottles without #1 or #2 on bottom.

Household Drycell Batteries — zip-lock bag with supplied Green Sticker : place on top of recyclables.
