Notorious Hiltonia

"Police Find Big Still in Exclusive Hiltonia Home", so reads the banner headline of the Trenton Evening Times from July 3, 1930. And the "exclusive" Hiltonia home was 207 Renfrew — my house! "Big" was no exaggeration: cement block vats contained 45,000 gallons of fermenting mash. Two arrests were made, and a thriving bootlegging enterprise came to an abrupt end.

This was no mere zoning infraction, but an illegal enterprise operating in flagrant violation of the 18th Amendment to the US Constitution. The federal authorities were fighting an up-hill battle in Trenton, trying to bring law and order to a city where alcohol was openly distributed. One sign of what they were up against is that in the 1920's, the Trenton Chief of Police gave his personal protection to bootleggers and threatened to arrest any federal agents who tried to enforce the Volstead Act in the City.

I first heard rumors about that basement still soon after I moved into 207 Renfrew in 2003, when Doug Forer, my then backyard neighbor (Cornwall), told me two interesting stories about my new home. The first story was that there was once a still in my basement. Of course I was intrigued, but I didn't really know whether to believe it—maybe it was an urban legend? I did spend hours looking for evidence in my basement, but could find nothing that indicated distilling ever happened there.

Years later, in 2011, I found the evidence I was looking for after Michael Nalbone sent out an email explaining how to research the history of our Hiltonia houses using the resources at the Trentoniana room at the Trenton Public Library on Academy Street. I followed Michael's advice and that's how I came to find the 1930 report in the Trenton Evening Times (via microfilm). There on the front page was a photo of my (disgraced?) home. It was so satisfying to find the story after all that time, complete with colorful details: Edward Shelfer (who was renting the house) denying the existence of the still despite the overwhelming

stench of all that fermenting mash; Mrs. Shelfer ironing shirts in the back of the house during the raid.

So Doug's story turned out to be true after all. But Doug had also given me another story to investigate, and that one I have yet to prove. The second story was that Eleanor Roosevelt once came to tea at 207 Renfrew. I'd love to believe Mrs. Roosevelt once had tea here—and, after all, Doug Forer was right about the still, so maybe he was right about Eleanor Roosevelt, too? If so, let's hope that when she dropped in to visit, it was many years after those notorious days in 1930 and the stench of the fermenting mash had long vanished.

The Cookie Jar

If you have attended any of our recent meetings, then you have enjoyed the yummy homemade creations of Georgia Wallar, our Hospitality chair. And, lucky for us, she is willing to share some of her recipes for delicious treats. Here's another one to warm up your ovens.

Cider-Gingerbread Bundt Cake

CAKE:

- 4 tablespoons softened unsalted butter
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 4 teaspoons gingerbread spice
- ½ tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 large eggs
- 1 ½ cups unbleached allpurpose flour
- 3 tablespoons boiled cider
- 3 tablespoons molasses
- 1 cup grated apple

GLAZE:

2 tbs. unsalted butter
2 tablespoons boiled cider
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tsp. gingerbread spice
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon ginger
½ teaspoon cloves

TO MAKE THE CAKE:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Grease a small bundt-style pan (about 7")
- Beat together the butter, oil, sugar, spice, salt, baking soda, baking powder until light and fluffy, about 4 to 5 minutes.
- Add the eggs one at a time, beating after each addition until the batter is fluffy. Scrape the bottom and sides of the bowl.
- Beat in half the flour, and the boiled cider. Scrape the bottom and sides of the bowl, then beat in the remaining flour followed by the molasses. Fold in the grated apple.

- Pour the batter into the prepared pan.
- Bake the cake for 38-42 minutes until a cake tester inserted into the center comes out clean.
- Remove the cake from the oven, and cool for 5 minutes before turning it out of the pan.

TO MAKE THE GLAZE:

- While the cake is still warm, heat the butter, boiled cider, sugar, and spices together until the sugar has dissolved, stirring until well combined.
- Brush the glaze onto the warm cake; allow the cake to cool completely before slicing.





TCCA's Pon Wallar Scholarship Award

Several Hiltonians attended the Trenton Council of Civic Associations' annual celebration and awards ceremony on November 9th. We had the pleasure of meeting the 2018 recipient of the Don Wallar Scholarship Award, Sema'J Berry, who is currently a student at Mercer County Community College.

She has her sights on eventually earning a degree in psychology at Rutgers within five years. Sema'J has been very involved in many community endeavors and service projects, all of which have affirmed her desire to serve others. One of her goals is to open a year-round



community center in Trenton.

Crime Prevention Tips

As some of you know, I work in the insurance industry. A couple of years ago I sent out an email regarding breaking and entering and robbery of abandoned homes. The recommendations below came from risk engineers with whom I used to work:

- Periodically check on the house. Walk the perimeter; look for broken windows, doors that have been left ajar, or ladders leaning against the house. Peek inside and look for blankets, sleeping bags, or debris from food, which could be evidence of squatters.
- Mow the lawn and water the landscaping. In the case of foreclosed homes, the bank might hire someone to come out and do this, but abandoned homes in real estate limbo will typically be neglected.
- Install timers and motion sensors on any outdoor lights. Any floodlights
 that point in the direction of the vacant house should have timers and
 motion sensors. That way, potential thieves will have trouble planning
 an unseen break-in.
- Occasionally park your car in the driveway. If the house is bank-owned
 or on the market, you should call and ask permission before doing this,
 but a car in a driveway indicates that the house is occupied.
- Collect discarded mail and newspapers. An overflowing standalone mailbox or newspapers piling up on the porch mean only one thing: nobody is home. This is a huge red flag for any burglars or squatters in the area.
- Shovel and de-ice the driveway and sidewalks. Not only will this
 demonstrate that the property is taken care of, but it will also guard
 against any slips or falls.
- Put up signs. Alarm company signs or decals or even a "Beware of Dog" sign go a long way in deterring potential burglars and squatters. Remember to ask permission if the house is on the market or owned by the bank, however.
- Organize a community watch program. By gathering neighbors and asking them to volunteer their time, you can monitor the neighborhood and create plans for what to do in the event of a break-in or other emergency situation.

Keep in mind that there are issues of liability if the true owner of the house would consider neighbors as trespassers. Nonetheless, it was strongly recommended that we organize an around-the-clock community watch program and well publicize it in the neighborhood and in the City. This will help to stem the tide of criminal behavior. We should continue to use email as an immediate communication tool about potential criminal activity.

New Tax Exemption

All veterans (as of now, the definition of a "veteran" is anyone with a DD-214 that shows Honorable Discharge) who are residents of New Jersey can get a \$3,000 personal tax deduction from their income on STATE taxes for 2017.

In order to get this deduction, the veteran needs to submit a copy of his/her DD-214 and a form to the NJ Division of Taxation. This link has all of the info and the form: http://www.state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/newexemptionveterans.shtml

Please note that (1) the website says that it may take up to 3 months for this to be processed, so don't wait until April 15th to submit it; and (2) you have to print the form, sign it, and then scan it as a PDF in order to submit it online.

If you submit it online, then you will get 3 emails: confirmation that you submitted it; confirmation Taxation received it; and then a claim number from Taxation.

Researching Your Home's History.....

The Trentoniana Room at the Trenton Free Public Library is an excellent source of information about your house, property records, and tax information. The records might include a photograph. Another resource is the website www.genealogybank.com. As Michael Nalbone explained in an email in 2011, this website has access to the Trenton Times going back many years, into the 1800's. The website is also used for genealogy purposes, so you can look up info about your family as well. Create your account to begin your no-risk 30-day trial – get unlimited access to all records found for you, and more.

The process to look up info on your house is simple: on the main page find "historical newspapers." On the historical newspapers page, type in your house number where it asks for "last name." Where it asks for first name, type in your street name (do not list the avenue, blvd., ONLY list the street name). Then in "Advanced Search" where it asks for "Include keywords with search," type in Trenton and you should find a state list where you should select NJ to narrow the search down as much as possible.

The information below is quoted from Michael's original email:

"This should give you lots of links to newspaper articles connected to your house...photos, announcements, articles about the owners.

From those listings I found quite a few that were relevant. Once you go through those listings you can do a search again with the owner's names that you found and find even more info about them. It was fascinating to learn the history of the house, but also about Trenton and what is was like to live here throughout the century.

This whole process could take just a few hours and you could find lots of interesting stuff. I found that the "almost" original owner of our house (whom I never knew about) was arrested for check fraud for writing fake checks for a new car and car supplies, and for \$25,000 for purchasing our house! Ironically, in that check fraud case he had also swindled the future 4th owner of our house, who ran a tire business!"


