Hiltonia "Worthy Projects" Initiative for 2021

Annually the Hiltonia Association conducts a Worthy Projects initiative. The concept is to pick several (usually 2) not-for-profit organizations that are outstanding in serving Trenton's population. Then, through a process of individual donations from Hiltonia residents, increased by Hiltonia Association funds, each of the designated organizations receives a donation indicating the list of individual donations plus the Hiltonia Association match of up to \$250 for each recipient organization.

This year the Worthy Projects committee is proposing two potential recipients:

The 1719 Trent House Museum

Located at 15 Market Street in downtown Trenton, William Trent, a Philadelphia merchant, built Trent House as a summer estate. This was in the early 18th century when the location, along the Delaware River, was a real wilderness. There was no city, no permanent neighbors, and only occasional visits by indigenous people who had lived along the river for thousands of years before European colonization.

Three centuries later, thanks largely to the efforts of the Trent House Museum staff and volunteers, the authentic history of the house and its people is being uncovered, documented and shared. Open for guided tours of the building and grounds, the museum also conducts programs and events to highlight the life and times of Trent House.

Trenton Animals Rock

Not long ago the Trenton Animal Shelter was a sad case, with overcrowded holding pens, few services other than basic necessities, and one of the highest kill shelters in the state. To improve the situation, the City chose the nonprofit, Trenton Animals Rock (TAR) to manage animal welfare services. After several years of close cooperation, TAR and Trenton Animal Control (TAC) have substantially improved the state of Trenton' animal welfare. The euthanasia rate is now approaching a "no-kill" status.

They also are working cooperatively with the organization Trenton Cats Rescue (TCR) to upgrade the services available to that organization's clientele as well.

Unfortunately, all of the good works and cooperation referenced above need money well above what the City can provide. A recent fundraising request from TAR expressed their dilemma as follows:

"The changes we've made to improve the quality of life for animals in the Trenton Animal Shelter have been nothing short of incredible. But, the building is terrible and old, and the kennels are loud and out-of-date in design. The cat room is tiny and crowded. There is no space to treat the sick, to heal those in recovery, or to encourage the public to spend time looking for their new best friend.

Our wish is to raise enough for a new facility; a place where cats have a dedicated space to play, where dogs can have meets in quiet, comfortable rooms and where we can safely quarantine new, sick, injured and recovering animals. This is what these animals need. This is what they deserve."

The Association will match individual contributions from Hiltonians of up to \$250.00 for each organization. Residents of Hiltonia who would like to participate should make out separate check(s) payable to the Trent House and/or Trenton Animals Rock. The checks should be delivered to President Jeannie Weakliem (12 Hilvista Blvd.) as soon as possible, but no later than January 10, 2022. If you want a 2021 tax deduction for your charitable deduction, please date it for the end of the year.

From the Archives By Terri O'Prey

This August 1986 article by Hiltonia treasure Pat Flores called out to me for republishing. We moved to the neighborhood days before the annual Garden Party, which was followed in quick succession by Flamingo Socials where I had a chance to chat with my new neighbors and learn more about Hiltonia's history. We found the neighborhood warm and welcoming, and I loved hearing stories about people's homes and their history. It's interesting to imagine Hiltonia in 1930, desolate with mostly empty lots. I'm glad that distrust of strangers and unfriendliness are no longer primary descriptors of its residents, and I look forward to a future where gathering together is once more a simple and natural process.

Hiltonia Reflections, by Pat Flores (Hiltonia Association Historian)

In 1925, Samuel Hilton began developing this area he named for himself, and advertised as "this wonderful place for a home." On Sunday, July 13, 1986, *The Trentonian* carried a full-page article on page 43 about the inception of Hiltonia, naming the earliest residents and where they lived.

The feature was written by Sally Lane, who is very much an historian. Going back into the archives of the *Trenton Times*, she reports that on Sunday, March 1, 1925, a small story at the top of the real estate page proclaimed, "Hilton to Start Large Operation," with a sub-headline: "Developer of Hiltonia Plans Dozen Houses at Cost of \$240,000."

As a complement to the newspaper story, John Vogler of Buckingham Avenue called to reminisce about the early days of Hiltonia. He consented to type up his thoughts, and kindly allowed me to share them with you. We all thank you, John, for giving us a glimpse into the past. Here is John's story:

Moonshine in Hiltonia

I grew up in the West End, about a mile from Hiltonia. By 1930, Hiltonia was semi-developed, with houses only on Cadwalader, Buckingham, and Kensington, plus a few on lower Cornwall. The Depression had halted all development and most of Hiltonia consisted of streets, sidewalks, and empty lots.

My father was a city sanitary inspector, and in this period he investigated a complaint of foul odors from an empty lot in Hiltonia. Much to his surprise, he found that a Prohibition still in one of the homes was discharging its waste products into an adjacent empty lot. The "Revenooers" were dispatched, and Hiltonians were wary of strangers thereafter.

When I was a teenager I often got summer jobs cutting weeds in the empty lots. I received \$2 for a 50-foot lot -- good money for those Depression days. It was hard, hot work, usually taking one morning for a 50-foot lot. I would work with scythe and sickle all morning, swim in the canal after lunch, and return after dinner to work until dark. The bushes, vines, and poison ivy were tough. The few residents were so unfriendly that I had to carry my own drinking water. I never dreamed that I would one day live on "Cracker Hill," as Hiltonia was called in those days.

A note from Pat: According to John, Cracker Hill was a nickname bestowed by "locals," because when the new homeowners were through paying their mortgages and taxes, they would have only enough money left to buy crackers. It appears that in 60 years, we have come full circle.




Hiltonia Book Club: Beautiful Ruins

Why join a book club? Probably the top answer for me is to read books that I might not choose on my own. We all have our comfort zones and habits, and book clubs take us out of them. I remember reading *Blink* by Malcolm Gladwell as a book club pick many years ago. It wasn't originally on my radar, but I was asked what I thought about the book in a job interview shortly after I'd read it. It felt great to be able to answer the question rather than flounder for a response. Even though I didn't get the job.

I recently selected a non-fiction book about a female WWII spy for a book club (The book was *Agent Sonya*.) During our discussion, several members of the club admitted that they weren't looking forward to reading it since they rarely read non-fiction. But everyone completely enjoyed the book and some even researched additional books on similar topics.



Other reasons for joining a book club? Conviviality and good conversation, for sure. And if it's the Hiltonia Book Club, then good food and wine as well.

I attended my first Hiltonia Book Club meeting on October 24, and it checked all of the boxes. There were 10 of us in all, and we were able to sit outside, yet stay protected from the elements on Kathi Eckert's porch. The book we read was *Beautiful Ruins* by Jess Walter, and as it took place largely in Italy, the menu was Italian. The food was bountiful – two types of lasagna, pesto, bruschetta, antipasto, Caesar salad, figs and prosciutto along with cannoli and tiramisu for dessert.

The wine flowed as well, but I don't think we needed it to get the conversation flowing. The reaction to the book was decidedly mixed. Some people didn't like it at all while others thought it was just okay. Criticism included dislike of the writing style as well as some aspects of the story itself. I think I was the odd person out – I thoroughly enjoyed the book and have since recommended it to friends. But I think I'm correct in saying that we all had a lovely time – even if you don't like a book, a book club offers a great opportunity to vent!

The city of Trenton is conducting a survey to gather input from residents and other stakeholders to inform the design of projects to revitalize and rejuvenate the downtown area. The survey is being conducted in conjunction with the state

Department of Community Affairs Neighborhood Preservation Program (NPP). In October 2021, Trenton was awarded a five-year NPP designation. Trenton's downtown will receive up to \$125,000 a year for five years to assist with economic and community development.

- Just a reminder to keep our neighborhood streets clear on Wednesdays to ensure that the street sweeper can do a thorough job of cleaning our streets.
- If you hire a lawn service, please make sure your service knows it's responsible for hauling away any leaves or debris collected outside of City pickup dates. Otherwise, you, as the resident, are responsible for bagging it all or transferring it to your trash cans. It CANNOT be left loose in the gutters before the defined collection dates.
