Summer Programs for Our Youth By Paulette Ayres

At the April meeting of the Trenton Council of Civic Associations (TCCA), Police Director Wilson informed attendees of several youth community oriented programs.

Trenton Police Youth Summer Camp 2022

This is a four week long program. The week long sessions begin on July 11th, and end on August 19th. Students can only participate in one session. The program is available to approximately 120 Trenton youth from 10 to 15 years old. Students must have a letter of recommendation from a teacher or principal. Applications are being accepted as of May 2nd, with a deadline for receipt of completed applications on June 24, 2022.

Applications can be picked up at the Trenton Police Department headquarters located at 225 North Clinton Avenue in the main lobby, or at this link.

Police Explorers Program

The Youth Explorers program is part of a nationally recognized career education program. It involves youth directly in positive police officer and community interaction. The program is open to teenagers age 14 that have completed the eighth grade and adults age 18 through 20. The Explorers program offers youth an awareness of the criminal justice system through training, practical experiences, competition and other activities. Applicants must have a letter of recommendation from a teacher or principal. Applications must be completed and returned by June 24, 2022.

Come spend a fun filled summer with us including activities such as swimming lessons, arts & crafts, field trips & much more. This program operates June 20, 2022 through August 26, 2022. Chinese authors, and even a copy of the curriculum Pat developed as a result of her fellowship.

While catching up with each other we feasted lightly on Vernon's from-scratch egg rolls, pot-stickers, mandarins, fortune cookies, Chinese New Year sweets, and wine. Pat, resplendent in gold, soon called us to order and began the discussion. Many among us had read the book at some point, and the conversation flowed freely and ranged across such topics as foot binding, famine, agricultural vs. industrial societal

conditions, current events, and of course the story of Wang Lung and O-lan. This was an afternoon well spent, with good company and conversation, and I left inspired to read the book.

From the Archives By Terri O'Prey

With summer upon us, this collection of Cadwalader Park memories from June 1982 called out to me for republishing. I would love to have experienced the park in its glory days!

Editor's Note: The original article was comprised of six students' interviews, but they could not all be included due to publication space limitations. For the full story, go to our website and view the June 1982 issue.

Cadwalader Park By Cathy Schroth

(Cathy Schroth, an eighth grade student at Blessed Sacrament, interviewed Mrs. Raymond Schroth, grandmother, on March 24, 1982.)

I interviewed my grandmother, Mrs. Raymond Schroth, who recalled that our cousin Alice Kusar and her brother, Bill, and their parents and grandmother lived at Ellarslie and ran an ice cream concession stand during the early 1900s, at the turn of the century.

My grandmother remembers Cadwalader Park as a daily place to go with children. It was famous for its beautiful trees, flowerbeds, its island with a weeping willow in the center of the pond, and beautiful flowering cherry trees. It had a beautiful playground, pony rides, and animals to feed.

In the evening, band concerts, such as the famous Winkler Band, were held in the open air theater. Often famous men would come from different parts of the country to speak on politics or other issues of the times.

The cars took the same roads that we have today. However, the main entrance to the park had large red urns filled with beautiful flowers. The tennis courts were famous for being the only clay courts in the area. They were used by many great local tennis players. Tennis tournaments were held there on weekends.

In the 1950s a "Theater in the Park" was started. Broadway musicals and dramas were put on by the well-known producer and director Lee Yapp. All of his productions received great acclaim and were supported by local theatergoers, including my mother and father.

Cadwalader Park: An Interview By Robert Paci

(Robert Paci, a seventh grader at Blessed Sacrament, interviewed his mother, Catherine Paci, on March 25, 1982.) In 1968, the first year my parents lived here, they discovered Cadwalader Park. My mother and father visited the park and enjoyed it. Often they would go to the picnic grounds and have a cookout on Sundays. This made them joke about having gone out to dinner three weeks in a row.

They also went to the theater. My parents were first introduced to the theater in the park when my father's friend at work gave them tickets. They went to the theater a few more times and were very sorry when it burned down in 1969. My parents would also take their pet kitten, Tiger, to the park. Once when it went up a tree, a little girl came by. She asked them if they had a tiger, because she heard them calling "Tiger!," and they replied "yes." When my parents bought a house, they bought one by Cadwalader Park.

Cadwalader Park By Anthony Corrado

(Anthony Corrado, an eighth grader at Blessed Sacrament, interviewed Frank Corrado, his father, on March 25, 1982.) I interviewed my father, Frank Corrado, and I asked him if he remembers something about Cadwalader Park. He said in 1952-53 he practiced baseball in the gully of Cadwalader Park with Trenton Post Number 93, Schroth's American Legion Team, who were the New Jersey state champions in 1953. He also remembers watching city league football games in the gully during 1948-50.

Passage Theatre – Another Local Gem By Pat Rodeawald

Passage Theatre is Trenton's only non-profit, professional theatre – and it's a short ten-minute drive from Hiltonia. Passage was established in 1985, and since then has been producing new, socially relevant plays that are meant to reflect and resonate with the community. The plays are performed in the Mill Hill Playhouse, a Gothic revival building constructed in 1873 as a church.

As part of all productions, Passage provides community dialogues related to each play, post-show discussions and educational resource guides for schools.

This year's works were all focused on Trenton. The first, *The OK Trenton Project*, told the true story of a sculpture created by local children under the direction of Eric Schultz from Grounds for Sculpture. The sculpture, a hand making the 'ok' sign was removed with no discussion because it was thought to resemble a gang sign. The play was based on interviews with all the participants, from the Mayor to the kids who created the sculpture. It was a moving piece about what art means to a community.

Next up was *Janet Wide Awake: The Hedgepeth-Williams Dream*, which told the story of the court case that desegregated New Jersey schools in 1944 – ten years before Brown vs. Board of Education! The play was written and performed by students of the Hedgepeth-Williams Middle School for the Arts, along with theatre professionals, and served to educate many of us about this important piece of Trenton history.

The final show was *Group!*, which told the story of six women dealing with addiction issues through group therapy. Like all Passage productions, it handled a tough issue with grace and humor. And if you doubt that this topic was suited to a musical – just think of the success of *Hamilton*!

Passage Theatre planned on hosting a community night for Hiltonia and other interested neighborhoods on May 21. Neighbors were going to mingle before the performance at the historic Alexander Douglass house next door to Passage before heading over to see *Group!*. Unfortunately, a company member contracted COVID so the evening had to be cancelled. We hope to offer another similar opportunity in the near future.

- Just a reminder to keep our neighborhood streets clear on Wednesdays to ensure that the street sweeper can do a thorough job of cleaning our streets.
- If you hire a lawn service, please make sure your service knows it's responsible for hauling away any leaves or debris collected outside of City pickup dates. Otherwise, you, as the resident, are responsible for bagging it all or transferring it to your trash cans. It CANNOT be left loose in the gutters before the defined collection dates.
