#### **ATV Ordinance Passes**

As many of you may already know, the much-followed ATV ordinance (20-39) was unanimously approved by Trenton City Council on May 21. The "Off-Road Vehicle Regulations" ordinance incorporates NJ state legislation that gives law enforcement the right to seize vehicles as contraband since their use is not permitted on City streets, parks, or private property without permission of the property owner. It also sets requirements regarding the operation of these vehicles, such as the minimum age of the driver, insurance requirements, and the use of safety gear.

This ordinance was of particular interest to Hiltonians and the residents of other neighborhoods bordering Cadwalader Park and the canal path who have witnessed these illegal vehicles riding up and down our neighborhood streets with impunity. We've also seen the damage these vehicles have caused in Cadwalader Park, where their use has torn up grassy areas and endangered park visitors.

After a similar ordinance failed last year, At-large Councilman Jerell Blakely and East Ward Councilman Joseph Harrison worked closely with Police Director Sheilah Coley and brought the new ordinance to Council in early May. It was great to see the turnout from Hiltonians at the Council meetings, special thanks go out to those who spoke in support of the ordinance and shared stories of the negative impact of these vehicles on the neighborhood and Trenton as a whole.




## Hiltonia Book Club: The Giver of Stars, by Jojo Moyes

Our menu was inspired by the novel's geographical setting, and we feasted on bourbon/maple chicken wings, fried chicken,

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


## **Beekeepers Among Us**

## Notes from the Zoom Meeting with Mayor Gusciora

Around a dozen Hiltonians joined a Zoom call arranged by the Mayor's Office on Thursday, June 11, at 5:30 PM. Dennis kicked off the meeting by introducing the Mayor, who then provided updates on current Covid-19 statistics and City reopening plans. Mayor Gusciora then responded to questions we'd submitted in advance and took additional questions from attendees.

#### **UPDATES**

**Covid-19** (for up-to-date statistics go to <a href="https://trenton-covid-19-response-trenton-fire.hub.arcgis.com">https://trenton-covid-19-response-trenton-fire.hub.arcgis.com</a>)

- Cases are slowing (6 positive tests on the day we met).
- ~3,600 total cases (29 people hospitalized, 21 recovering at home, 10 healthcare workers).
- Testing has slowed, so the County is winding down its managed testing sites. Trenton plans to keep the ward walkup sites open, under reduced hours.
  - West Ward, Thursdays, Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, 801 W. State Street
- Testing is by appointment only. There is no charge for testing at any Mercer County-run site. You must have a physician's order to be tested.
  - Don't have a physician? Call Henry J. Austin Health Center at 609-278-5900 to see if you need testing. They can help you to talk with a doctor by phone or video.

- The City has distributed more than 150,000 free single-use face masks.
- 70% of the City's personal protective equipment (PPE) was donated by outside groups.

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#### Curfew

- Emergency curfew has been lifted, but the customary summer curfew (June 11 to September 1—9:59 PM to 6:00 AM—juveniles under the age of 18 must be indoors overseen by a parent or legal guardian and off City streets and roadways by 10 PM) remains in place.
- The emergency curfew was put in place not because of Covid-19, but because of increased crime.

#### Reopening

- June 15, outdoor dining will be allowed. Parklets are one way to make that possible for small restaurants. So far 15 restaurants have applied to have them built and installed. City is raising money to fund them. Stay tuned for updates on timeline and volunteer opportunities.
- Block grant funding being used for small business relief (low-interest loans).
- Trenton Central High School graduation being planned for Thunder stadium.
- Cadwalader Park will remain a pedestrian park for the time being (will continue to be blocked from vehicles).

#### **QUESTIONS FROM HILTONIANS**

1. Will we have any of the summer concert series this year?

The 2020 Levitt AMP Summer Music Series has been cancelled. It's possible that pop-up events will unfold. Art All Night will be virtual. Thunder stadium is expected to remain closed.

- 2. I am curious about the qualifications for the volunteers needed to build the "parklets" downtown. How "skilled" in carpentry does one need to be? I am interested in helping, but don't know if it is beyond my abilities.
  - Special skills are not required. Fundraising is ongoing, so construction has not begun.
- 3. Any reflections on the City's response to the Covid-19 crisis and increased violence in our city? We've been preparing for Covid-19 since Chinese New Year, when we had advance warning of its severity. Expansion of community policing had already been underway and continues. The City is working with civic groups and community members to try to find ways to end gang violence. A state pilot polling program via the Attorney General is in the works to improve policing in Trenton.
  - 4. What plans does the City have for contact tracing?

    There is limited contact tracing in Trenton; however, the State of New Jersey will hire at least 1,000 people to serve as contact tracers and will coordinate with local health agencies in this effort.
  - 5. How's the Census going?

There are no known plans for sending out Census workers door to door.

6. What's your assessment of recent demonstrations in our City?

Residents are united in outrage, and the Floyd situation seems to have galvanized the entire nation. The Mayor has signed Barack Obama's mayor's pledge to reform the internal affairs complaint process. Most protests have been peaceful and productive. The looting involved some outsiders taking advantage of the situation. State police, county sheriff's officers, and TPD were out in force that day. As the crowd dwindled, police presence was reduced, and violence ensued. More protests are planned and the Mayor remains hopeful for systematic change.

7. Is the City prepared for a second wave of Covid-19?

The City is stockpiling PPE, has a proposal out for private testing, and is continuing to make plans for alternative emergency housing.
