WORTHY PROJECTS 2022

As per previous years, \$500 from the Hiltonia Association's annual budget was set aside to support its Worthy Projects initiative. This year, the membership chose **The Trenton Literacy Movement, INC.** and the **Locust Hill African Cemetery and Museum Project** as recipients. See descriptions below.

Annually the Association has offered to match individual contributions from neighbors of up to \$250 per project. Last year, our generous neighbors far exceeded the match amount in awarding **Trenton Animals Rock** a combined total of \$1,170.00 and **Trent House** a combined total of \$630.00.

Residents of Hiltonia who would like to participate this year should make out <u>separate check(s)</u> payable to **The Trenton Literacy Movement** or the **6th Regiment US Colored Troops--Locust Hill Project** or **both.** Checks should be delivered to Jeannie Weakliem, at 12 Hilvista Blvd. as soon as possible, but no later than December 31, 2022.

The mission of the **Trenton Literacy Movement (TTLM)**, a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization, is to enable students in Trenton public elementary schools to read at grade level by 3rd grade. Since **TTML** was founded in 2016, fifty-seven percent of students who started below grade level caught up to or exceeded grade level in reading. **TTML** after-school literacy programs are in all 14 Trenton public elementary schools.

The **Locust Hill African Cemetery and Museum Project** is sponsored by the 6th Regiment United States Colored Troops, a nonprofit organization engaged in the restoration of the Locust Hill Cemetery and establishing a museum to honor and preserve the black lives laid to rest there.

New Running and Walking Trail Planned at Cadwalader Park

A cross country running and walking trail is under development at Cadwalader Park, the City of Trenton's "emerald jewel," as the result of an effort involving the city's Recreation Department, the Trenton Central High School cross country program, and local running, outdoor, education, and civic communities.

The cross country trail will be one of Mercer County's few non-asphalt distance running trails and will provide runners, walkers, nature observers, and other users a safe, soft surface to exercise and enjoy the outdoors. Design and development have already begun and are expected to finish by next summer.

The trail will be roughly eight feet wide over mowed grass and packed cinders. It is a looped circuit that can accommodate a 4k (2.4 mile) or 5k (3.2 mile) walk or run along the Stuyvesant Avenue and Cadwalader Drive section of the park.

The route was planned by Damian Kellogg, Trenton Central High School head cross country coach and biology teacher, and Jordan Antebi, local runner and volunteer, with approval from the Trenton Recreation Department.

Since 2019, efforts have been underway to renew and expand the park's cross country programs, which date back a century. Efforts include the trail, as well as piloting a middle school cross country feeder program. Completing the trail will also support a return of high school races to the park after a 25-year hiatus.

To help complete the trail, Luis Pedemonte, a senior engineer with the recreation office, volunteers and city work crews have been marking, filling, and reseeding divots. Until now, these have been a safety problem for runners and other park users. There are plans to mark the trail, but details of that are to be determined.

Driving this project is a Cadwalader Park working group with city government support that is focusing on restoring the park in three key areas: maintenance, access, and programming. As efforts around the park continue to develop, more announcements will be posted about the working group, other programs, and future opportunities to help support the park.

Halloween Heaven...that's what Halloween turned into on the night of October 31, according to Peter Stern of Renfrew, who turned his mental clock back to the late fifties to conjure up visions of trick or treating here in the "good old days".

The neighborhood was different then, more isolated from the rest of the city, and with considerably fewer houses. Carloads of Trenton kids would be driven to Hiltonia and dropped off on the street corners to cover the territory and amass what fortunes they could in candy and other goodies.

Every ghost and goblin would head first for the home of Mr. and Mrs. Schragger on Hilvista Boulevard. Peter recalled that they had three aluminum tables set up in their driveway, forming a U-shape and laden with huge glass bowls of candy, along with bowls of shiny pennies and nickels—and you could take some of EACH. The Schraggers started the tradition when their own children were trick or treating, and loved to see the kids come through in costume.

Steve Schragger, Charles' son, now lives in the family homestead. I called him to ask a few details and he told me his parents continued this ritual until the early sixties. At some point, it seemed to them that avarice had taken over, and they discontinued Halloween altogether.

Hiltonia readers are on a roll, with frequent fall events:


